## C CPE Records Relating to Excise Offences 1816-1834 heard by Justices in Hull

**Historical background :** The collection of customs duties, that is duty imposed on imported and exported goods and the collection of taxes on British goods, or excise, were key sources of revenue for the government and the Justices of the county would hear offences regarding these issues.

- C CPE/1 Evidence of information against Simon Appleton under the Excise Laws for wetting, watering, sprinkling and causing [suffering] [to the] corn and grain before the end or expiration of 12 days and 288 hours. At the end of the evidence, dated 17 Jun 1816, it is recorded that 'Ann Johnson for the like Guilty £50 convicted in being one quarter part of that penalty'. 1 item
  C CPE/2 Charges brought against John Bates by William Cramp, Officer of Customs for offences of carrying, concealing spirit, tobacco, pint of Geneva and four ounces of Green Tea: one

- C CPE/3 Chas. Lutwidge, Esq., versus Jas. Murray, Information Laws 17 Nov 1827 of Customs for the offence of knowingly harbour, keep and conceal two gallons and three quarters of a gallon of foreign Geneva, three pounds and three quarters of tea 1 item
