Historical Background: Prior to 1887 responsibilty for dealing with fires fell to the 'reserve man' at each of Hull's four police stations. In 1884 the Hull Watch Committee purchased a Messrs Merryweather & Sons Patent Double-Cylinder Steam Fire Engine and Sculcoates Hall in Worship Street was acquired for the purposes of conversion into a fire station in 1886. The Hull City Fire Brigade Sub Committee was formed from the Hull Watch Committee in November 1886 by Mr Ald. Larard as Chairman, Mr Ald. Stuart, and Councillors Briggs, Wilde, Gilbert, A. Rollit and Wheatley. On the 27 May 1887 Inspector Elliott was appointed as Superintendent and he was placed in charge of 8 men who constituted the first Hull City Fire Brigade.

Record Book of the Hull Police Fire Brigade
Record begun by resolution made 16 Jan 1895,
paid for by the Chairman of the Fire Brigade
Committee, and kept by the Honorary Secretary
George Dawson (retired 5 Jul 1913, died 11 Aug
1932), 'Being an Account of all interesting matters
respecting the formation of the Brigade, and its
gradual improvement towards efficiency. Also of
any Meritoroius Acts or Brave Deeds performed
by the Members, together with any promotions,
retirements, &c.'.

The front of the volume contains a list of the Chief Constables of Hull with the dates of their appointment covering the period 1836-1920, and a photograph of Alderman F. Larard, Mayor of Hull and Chairman of the Fire Brigade Committee from 10 Nov 1886 to his death on 1 Sep 1918. Entries include references to promotions, injuries, deaths, presentations, events, major fires, additions to Fire Brigade staff numbers, government inspections, scales of pay, events during WWI, etc.

Please note that a number of pages have become detached and are loose inside the volume.

Notable entries include the following:

Feb and March 1895 - 'The Distress in Hull' lasting two months during which tea and soup were provided to 12,147 poor children by the Police Fire Brigade;

- 2 Aug 1896 Beverley Road Baptist Chapel on fire:
